Message from the Manse

One of the scribes came near and heard them disputing with one another, and seeing that he answered them well, he asked him, "Which commandment is the first of all?" On the afternoon of Sunday 14th July we celebrated the 40th Anniversary of the Pastoral Centre.

As is usually the case with these things, it's very difficult to put an exact date on when the Pastoral Centre first began. One thing is for sure, it's totally impossible to look back over the history of the Pastoral Centre at Emsworth Methodist Church without feeling an intense sense of admiration for those involved in its early years and who have helped discern God's will throughout its long history.

The first whisperings of an idea in 1977, when the church opened its doors for tea and cake in celebration of the Queen's Silver Jubilee, grew into more regular opening from 1979 onward. A catalogue of building projects and redevelopments adapted the building to suit its changing purpose. Always the people were the priority – a warm welcome without expectations, a place where there was no pressure to move on even when tea cups were empty.

There's something to be said for taking a moment to pause and look back over our history. After all, it is only by knowing where we've come from that we can fully understand where we're going. The Celebration Service was attended by upwards of 70 people: regular visitors to the Pastoral Centre joined together with volunteers and people representing all the Christian denominations in Emsworth (and beyond!), showing how deeply woven its work is into the life of this community. Gerry, one of our regular visitors, read the Bible passage (above) reminding us of our calling to service and to community.

In the run up to the service a Post Box was put up in the Centre, giving everyone an opportunity to tell a story or offer a 'thank you' to be shared at the service. From these stories I gleaned twelve words / phrases, each of them encapsulating an aspect of Pastoral Centre life. These were:

Memories Unsung heroes Welcome Food Fun Worship Friendship Cheerfulness Mutual support Life together Lunch

Special occasions

Stories told, both in the Post Box and by Mandy, were sometimes funny, sometimes poignant, but always full of thankfulness for the good the Pastoral Centre has done and continues to do. It was only right that, during the service, all the volunteers - past and present - stood for applause.

It wouldn't be a Pastoral Centre occasion without cake, and many thanks to those who produced the fantastic edibles we enjoyed after the service. The 'Birthday Cake' (pictured) baked by Sandra was a sight to behold and a pleasure to eat.

Towards the end of the service a show of hands revealed the identities of the longest-serving volunteers (this position was tied!) and newest volunteer present, so they were given the honour of cutting the cake to yet more applause.

Emsworth Eco Day on 29th June

Most of us are aware from recent TV programmes - as well as the evidence of our own eyes - that plastic waste has a huge negative impact on our environment. As Christians we are called to be good stewards of creation, remembering that God made it and loves it. When plastic was first produced this exciting new material was said to last forever! Now we are beginning to see the consequences of its durability.

An ecumenical group with an interest in environmental issues scratched our heads about how to build awareness, not just of the effects of throwaway culture, but of some practical solutions to decrease our dependence on plastic. Then one day, over coffee in the Parish Office, the first Emsworth Eco Day was born!

The day's events were split between three main venues. At EMC we showed a recent film about the damage plastic and pollution is doing in our seas. We extended the opening hours of the Pastoral Centre to host a small 'mini-market' – thanks to the volunteers who made that possible. The Traidcraft Stall was there, and other stalls in International Hall sold everything from homemade natural soaps to pasta!

St James' Parish Hall was given over to workshops which included bagmaking, 'make do and mend' and 'plastic free cooking' (complete with a meal to take home).

The grounds of the Baptist Church came alive with a 'Plant and Produce Swap Shop', children's activities and stalls. The whole day ended with a

show including a young soloist, a dance recital, and a Q&A session with the waste management team at Havant Borough Council.

Added to all this there were litter picks. Oh, and a giant fish taking pride of plaice (sorry) in the centre of the square provided a fabulous talking point. In fact people are still talking about the fun they had, the things they learned and the new products they discovered. 'Will you do it again?' is a question we've been asked more than once. All I can say is 'Watch this space!'

Another August brings another Emsworth Show!

In past years Christians Together in Emsworth has had a recognized presence at the Show, and it's always fascinating how many people who wouldn't dream of coming into church will come up for a chat about life and faith (perhaps it's the free sweets?!). I've had some intriguing conversations with very interesting people, and not just with adults but around the colouring table, where children – who are always happy to say what they think – voice opinions on topics ranging from the environment to football to Jesus' favourite colour. Your guess is as good as mine!

This year, however, we're doing something a bit different: Christians Together in Emsworth is organizing a 'Youth Tug o' War Competition'! We are inviting teams of six young people aged 11-16 to participate: there will be a prize for the winners and another for the best-dressed team! If you know of any young people who would like to be involved but can't make up a full team, do let one of us know.

An activity like this will probably raise a few eyebrows (hopefully in a good way!) and will certainly raise the profile of Christians Together – perhaps prompting questions about what it means to be part of the family of the church. We already have several teams signed up, hopefully enough for nail-biting heats and semi-finals to take place throughout the day.

In addition to this, there will be a stall as usual. At the time of writing the plans for this are still in their infancy but it's likely that we will be giving away fruit, not just to weary 'tuggers' but to everyone. There'll be more information nearer the time, and a sign-up sheet for volunteers.

If you're not able to be at the Show, or even if you are, please can I ask you to hold it and particularly Christians Together in your prayers.
