Message from the Manse

In the past couple of weeks several people have asked for a copy of the story I told at church on Sunday 6th September, so I've decided to include it here this month. Please note that I didn't write this story! It's an ancient folk tale and I have adapted this version from a number of sources.

Stone Soup

One day, a traveller passed through a village. Times were hard, and people were not particularly warm or hospitable to strangers, or, indeed, to each other for that matter. There was little response to the traveller's hearty greeting, and his cheery attitude caused more irritation than anything else.

Unfazed by the lukewarm reception, he sat down in a corner of the village square and got busy with a large iron pot, whistling a merry tune as he did so. He proceeded to light a fire, fill the pot with water and, while waiting for the water to boil, made a big to-do about taking a knife, a soup ladle, and a polished stone, whistling all the while. All this activity attracted the attention of passers-by.

MHA Comes to Emsworth!

MHA is an award-winning registered charity which was started in 1943 to provide care, accommodation and support for older people throughout Britain. It is one of the largest charities in the UK and our mission is to improve the quality of life for older people. We currently provide a range of high-quality services to more than 18,200 older people:

- 4,935 older people live in 90 MHA care homes residential, nursing and specialist dementia care
- 2,690 older people live independently in 72 MHA retirement living communities with flexible support and personalised care
- \circ 10,580 older people are supported through 61 Live at Home schemes in the community



The MHA Live at Home schemes were set up to reduce loneliness and isolation in older people who still live independently in their own homes. No singing ability is necessary, and participants are guaranteed to feel uplifted at the end of the session.

Report from the meeting on 3rd October 2019

Matters Arising – There was no further news re ways of welcoming new residents. It was noted that venues of each church in the CTE leaflet might be incorporated in the next print run.

Follow-up and report of the Emsworth Show - It was agreed that it had been a very good and worthwhile event at the new New Life Church venue. CTE had a good-sized pitch with a gazebo under which there were activities for children, also leaflets offering further information. 400 pieces of donated fruit had been distributed and a tug of war was organised in the main arena. Deacon Laura Evans, Revd Jo Northey (Anglican Pioneer Minister) and Heather Powney (Baptist Church) were thanked for their hard work. Further help was provided by members of all our five churches. Revd Andrew Sheard had met the New Life Church leaders at a new fraternal gathering and would suggest they might like to join CTE.

CTE Christmas Cards - Arrangements were put in hand for all aspects of the Christmas Cards and this year we will order 6000.

Plans for Week of Prayer for Christian Unity – This will be held during the week 18^{th} – 25^{th} January 2020 and will follow the same format as previous years. The material has been prepared by the Maltese Churches. The morning, which will be no longer than 2 hours, will be hosted by the Baptist Church on Saturday 18^{th} January and the service at the end of the week will be hosted by the Methodist Church on January 26^{th} .

Christian Aid Report – Nell Jones reported that £3076 was collected during Christian Aid Week 12^{th} – 18^{th} May 2019, the amount being less than in previous years. The summer sale collected £249 and carol singing £375. There will be no Lent Lunches in 2020 but instead a coffee morning will be held in the Pastoral Centre. Carol Singing will take place on 13^{th} December and Heather Powney agreed to find musicians to accompany the singing. Thanks were extended to Nell and the committee.

Publicity Update – A comprehensive report from Stuart Thompson was circulated. Numbers of visitors to our website in recent months ranged from 25 in July to 83 in April when there was increased interest in our Easter events. Photographs of the Horticultural Show and the recent Southern Harbours Keswick event would be appreciated. Can you help? If so, please see Dot or Sue D.

Dates for fifth Sunday shared services – No service in December, 26/1/20 – Methodist Church, 29/3/20 – St Thomas a Becket, 31/5/20 – Baptist Church.

News from around the Churches

Baptist Church – The recent Southern Harbours Keswick (SHK) event had been very well attended and successful. A one-day SHK event is planned for 22 February 2020 and a three-day event for 17-19 September 2020. Messy Church has restarted on a monthly basis and a Christianity Explored course starts in January 2020. A new service aimed at young families '@ 4pm' starts in January. The church celebrates its 175th anniversary in July. **Catholic Church** – A new priest, Father John Thomas, has recently been ordained and welcomed at a service in Emsworth.

Methodist Church – Harvest Hymns and Fruit Surprise afternoon had been well received by those present, many of whom were users of the Pastoral Centre. The present Superintendent Minister Revd Andrew de Ville is to succeed Revd Andrew Wood as Chair of Southampton Circuit on 1/3/20. The new Superintendent Minister will be Revd David Muskett. There is to be a different style of worship on 4th Sunday evenings – quiet and contemplative, with different styles of music. A recent Taizé service had been held. Feedback would be very welcome – please contact Dot or Sue D.

URC – The Rainbows group and the Brownies are back meeting on the premises. There is a new heating system and piano. For the future, a moderator to cover Havant, Emsworth and Hayling Island may be considered but in the meantime there is an interregnum. A lay preacher from Gosport, Frank Mulholland, has oversight.

Anglican – St Thomas à Becket, Warblington, is commemorating the 850th anniversary of the death of St Thomas à Becket with the hope of raising the profile of the church and its special part in the community. There will be events throughout the year, concerts and speakers, all of which will be published. An Alpha Course has just started with 25 or so participants, some recruited from the recent house to house leaflet drop. Judith Dean is resigning as Parish Secretary and a new administrator will be appointed.

Breathing Space Retreats With God in Silence. A silent retreat with individual guidance.

Have you ever thought of going on a silent retreat? It is a wonderful opportunity to press the pause button in the hustle and bustle of daily life, to take time out and create a space for reflection.

Above all else it affords the opportunity to get in touch with God.

'Be still and know that I am God', writes the Psalmist.

Elijah finds God in the 'still small voice'.

We don't need to be afraid of silence.

God delights in our presence, so what is there to be afraid of?

There is a gentle way into silence, with conversation during the first meal, a briefing and the chance to meet fellow retreatants.

Then we go into silence – except for the 3 or 4 times during the retreat when each retreatant meets up with the member of the team who is accompanying them.

The team member is there to listen, to help make sense of what might emerge in the silence, and to offer resources to assist retreatants in their spiritual journey e.g. scripture passages, poems, pictures, meditations.

The whole retreat is surrounded by love, care and prayer in lovely peaceful surroundings, concluding with a shared Communion celebration.
